

After your Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) Visit

- A radiologist, who is a doctor trained to read mammograms, MRIs (magnetic resonance imaging) and ultrasounds, will review your X-rays.
- Approximately two weeks after your mammogram, you will get a letter or phone call from us telling you about your results.

If You Need More Tests

- Most women needing more tests do **not** have breast cancer.
- The screening site will send you a letter or call you to let you know that you need more tests.
- Your healthcare provider or the breast screening site will book these tests for you.
- If you go to another site to get your additional tests done, either you or the OBSP will be responsible for sending the X-rays there.

Coming Back For Breast Cancer Screening

- Until you reach age 73, you will get a letter from us reminding you when to come back for a mammogram. It is important to get screened regularly. If you have any questions talk to your healthcare provider.
- Once you are over age 73, you will no longer get letters from us, but you can call your local OBSP site to book an appointment after speaking with your healthcare provider about continuing to get screened.

Breast Health Studies

- To improve the benefits of screening the OBSP conducts studies (or research) about breast health. Therefore, you may be asked to be a part of a study. It is your choice whether or not to participate.
- All women who are screened through the OBSP, including women who are not part of a study, will get the same high-quality breast screening and all of your test results will stay confidential.
